Sculptural promise

Defining and exuberant, the kitchen Sally Caroline has designed for Panorama House is beyond divine.

he use of stone has been a hallmark of Sally Caroline's for some time, but it is the continuation of the same stone into the floor that has defined her approach. It is a subtle differentiator, but one that makes the kitchen space quite unique. Moreover, it amplifies the materiality and more clearly expresses the island's form, which is never ordinary.

In this extraordinary kitchen for Panorama House, set on a corner block in Victoria's leafy coastal suburb of Middle Park, the magnificent sculptural island is in fact a series of forms. Crafted from solid blocks of Arabescato, Brescia Green and Menta marble, the island called for expert stonemasonry, a robust steel framework, and precise craning into place. The result is a striking and technical triumph that will continue to look amazing for a great many years to come.

Tasked with strengthening the home's sight lines across the bay and city, while celebrating the playful personalities of the homeowners – a young family of four – the first move was to increase the kitchen's footprint. A lack of over counter cabinets, moreover, allows the kitchen to form a natural visual continuum with the whole. It also allows for a large kitchen window and direct engagement with the view.

The design answers these needs with an unexpected ascetic response of just a few materials: stone, wood and steel. However, each is expressed with clarity and precision. The hand-finished stainless-steel cabinetry with inset bronze finger pulls, for example, are solid and sleek. "It's extremely rewarding to pursue challenging details and have them executed with millimetre-perfect precision," says Sally Knibbs, Sally Caroline director.
